AGDF Experiences Five Star Week of Incredible Competition

The stands were filled with eager spectators at the Adequan® Global Dressage Festival (AGDF), as competitors from around the world took to the Global International Ring for the "Friday Night Stars" FEI Grand Prix Freestyle CDI 5*, presented by Diamante Farms, on Friday, February 12. Mikala Gundersen (DEN) and My Lady impressed the judging panel to earn a 79.075% for their first major win at AGDF this season. Fellow Dane Lars Petersen and Mariett followed in second place with a 76.600%, while Steffen Peters and Legolas 92 finished in third place with a 76.425%.

Gundersen and My Lady were one of the most winning combinations on the AGDF circuit in 2015 and their victory tonight marked their first CDI 5* win since 2013, when the duo took home first place in the CDI 5* Grand Prix Special at AGDF.

"Lady was really good. She was very good yesterday, but I planned to push a little bit more today and see if I could put her up a little bit higher in the neck," Gundersen said. "I had that in the warm-up and then when I came in, when my music was supposed to start it didn't, so I went to circle. Then the music started, and I tried to finish my circle, but Lady was like 'No, no. Wrong way,' and went for the centerline. Once I hit the centerline, she went into the passage, and I knew that we were good."

The pair thrives in consistency, and they are usually expected to finish atop their respective classes. Gundersen noted that Lady is reliable in big atmospheres such as the freestyle, even though she is an incredibly sensitive horse, because she is so well-versed in their choreography and enjoys performing for a crowd.

"Every time I go down the centerline it's a new feeling. This is a very sensitive horse, and it's not like we push a button and then get to go to a Grand Prix," she elaborated. "It's always different, and we are always trying to make it better. Since she's so sensitive, I don't always know what

WEF Sport Horse Auction to Include Diverse Range of Dressage Prospects in 2017

The Winter Equestrian Festival (WEF) Sport Horse Auction has always drawn a large crowd into the Global International Pavilion each year, as bidders from around the world come to The Stadium at Palm Beach International Equestrian Center (PBIEC) to view the next generation of top talent in equestrian sport. This year's WEF Sport Horse Auction will be hosted at 7:00 p.m. on Thursday, March 3, at The Stadium at PBIEC, showcasing 16 of Europe's finest international show jumping prospects.

Each horse is imported from the famous VDL Stud in The Netherlands, while owner and operator Janko van de Lageweg hand selects the specific horses who make the journey overseas to the equestrian capital of the world for potential buyers. In its fourth year, the WEF Sport Horse Auction has found incredible successful in placing top show jumping prospects with some of the most competitive barns in the United States.

In 2015, two young dressage horses were included in the WEF $% \left({{{\rm{A}}} \right)$

Sport Horse Auction for the first time ever, attracting a new audience to the thriving event and offering a new discipline access to one of the most elite sport horse auctions in the United States.

Rhegan White, representative for the Westphalian studbook in the United States, played an integral role in the selection process for these two unique mounts, discussing the potential for the dressage portion of the auction in the years to come. She emphasized the intensive search for top quality horses and explained how the auction offers an incredible opportunity for dressage breeders in Europe to expose their horses to a diverse market.

"Last year it was the first year and was very experimental. We were very pleased with the quality of horses that we were able to import," she explained. "Not only were they strong in their physical appearance and working ability, but also their movement and conformation. This is extremely important for anything that we want to import into the United

For Antonia Ax:son Johnson, business and horses are part of the same family legacy. Johnson is a fourth generation Chairman and Owner of Swedish based company, The Axel Johnson Group, as well as the Founder and Owner of top equestrian breeding and training farm, Lövsta Stud Farm. She grew up with an entrepreneurial mind and a love of all things equine that have been instilled in her family for over 100 years. Rooted in what Johnson calls a yin and yang alignment of these personal interests, she has become a leader in the development of modern equestrian sport. Continuing the family legacy, The Axel Johnson Group proudly returns as title sponsor of week seven's CDI-W 3* competition at AGDF. "When the Global Dressage Festival was introduced in Wellington five years ago, there was a sparse and scattered audience," Johnson said of the event. "Each year, we have seen new spectators come to watch with a growing enthusiasm. The show has grown by some 30% a year and has definitely come to stay. We are proud to be sponsors to this terrific dressage hub, and now with some of the world's best riders in the limelight."

"I just love being here," Johnson added. "The winter months we spend here do wonders. The horses become happy, supple and athletic, and we feel the joy of being immersed in a magic world of horses. Every person we meet is here for a horse reason!"

Johnson's great grandfather originally founded the family business, a trading company known as A. Johnson & Co., in 1873. The business has since developed into a worldwide operation, employing more than 25,000 people internationally with a turnover of close to 20 billion USD. The businesses are mainly in the Nordic countries and the United States.

"When it comes to business, we can really join forces with many to talk about what the equestrian sport can teach us in a broader sense," Johnson noted. "For me, that includes perseverance and a long term perspective. Riding gives life focus, total concentration, unwavering commitment and the excitement of those magical moments that occur. If you are running a business that is exactly what you need."

Antonia Johnson's love of horses stems from many summers spent on a ranch in Nevada with her parents. Much later she began importing and breeding American Morgan horses in Sweden with her father. Later she developed a fascination with and deep respect for the art of dressage, and took her family's legacy in entrepreneurship to the next level.

On January 1st, 2000, Johnson formed a partnership with one of the world's top dressage riders, Tinne Vilhelmson Silfvén, a six-time Olympian, currently ranked sixth in the world. Silfvén joined Johnson in building what is now the modern Lövsta Stud Farm and Johnson also took up dressage for the first time herself at the age of 50! With a fifth generation at the helm of the family business she now has time to ride two or three horses every morning.

Today, Lövsta Stud Farm is one of Sweden's leading stud farms. From a small beginning in a rebuilt cow barn with 12 stalls, Lövsta Stud Farm now has about 50 horses in total at two farms just north of Stockholm. The business includes a very successful stud station as well as competition activities at all levels from three-year-olds up to Grand Prix at the Olympics and World Championships. Lövsta supports young riders and young horses through the



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States. It isn't easy to find that quality of horse and is definitely a challenge. We were super picky with last year's selection."

J.J. Jaguar and Fürsten Vera set the stage for the inaugural year of dressage selections, with both taken at top dollar price. White expressed her excitement for the expansion and future of the auction with the inclusion of world-class dressage mounts from Europe readily available to the North American community.

"We thought the prices went very well, and we were really happy with that," she noted. "Looking forward, we want to make sure that it is quality and temperament that we are focused on. It's really about finding the breeders and people willing to work with us. This event is truly a two-year project for us."

Even though bidders will have to wait until 2017 for the presentation of additional dressage prospects, White is confident that she and her colleagues will source some of the finest dressage talent available in Europe for the North American equestrian community.

"We have our finger on the pulse for next year already. We have a breeder who is interested in sending their best stock and we'll be able to offer a variety of experience. We normally start with a group of ten horses and then narrow it down to four," said White, as she described the selection process. "Four is our optimum number for the auction. We work on it throughout the year and our breeders are very aware of what they need to provide. It is a different market here in the U.S., and we want to cater to the needs of the equestrian community here in Wellington."

White has been partnered with the Westphalian Stud for nearly four years, working to gain more exposure for the breed. She remarked, "It's very exciting for European breeders to have this type of direct entry into the United States market. That isn't something that they have access to most of the time. Melanie [Peterson] does a spectacular job putting on this auction. I feel very confident that our meetings with the breeders and our explanation of expectations will generate interest in the Westphalian breed here in North America, while bringing attention to the superior product these breeders are offering these buyers."

The breeding history of the Westphalian in Europe is intricate and well documented, spanning back over the past 200 years, as one of Germany's oldest equine studbooks.

"They're breeding 3,000 to 4,000 foals a year. It has to be a qualified dam and sire bloodline in order to be registered with our studbook," explained White. "From all of that, we narrow through our 8,000 members included in the association and go to the top breeders. We have several members who are incredibly excited about the opportunities available for the breed in the U.S. and are breeding specifically with this market in mind."

While standards for movement and quality remain the same for both Europeans and Americans, there are several other distinguishing factors that determine the right prospects for buyers outside of Europe. White remarked, "The American market has a specific requirement as to what they want, a wellmannered and incredibly athletic horse. They must all have the look as well. The Westphalian studbook is famous for producing even-tempered horses with athletic bloodlines, which makes them the perfect breed choice for this specific event."

Interestingly enough, as the demand for high quality equine prospects has increased around the world, the breeding capacity in Europe has seen a decrease since the recession in 2008. White noted this change and its impact on the market, "The breeding situation has changed a lot in Europe since the recession. It applies all across Europe. A lot of the breeders got out of the business because they got stuck with horses and decided that they wanted to be done with it. The challenge has become that there are all of these people looking for great horses and there is half the pool to choose from."


"For us, it's a great deal of public relations with not only the buying audience in Wellington, but also the breeders in Germany. It's an interesting time. It means that when we get these amazing horses over here, they're ready, through quarantine, and you can just drive home with them once you've purchased them. It's a great deal and an incredible opportunity," she continued.

As for next year's stock, White is already working to secure the diversity of prospects from the Westphalian Stud.

"We'd like to have two mares and two geldings for next year to offer more variety in what we have available. We're starting from fresh and trying to build a client base here in Wellington. It's an exciting time of this breed, and we're already looking to source the best prospects possible for next year's auction."

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I have, but I had a good feeling and she was on it tonight. She wanted to do well."

The stands were overflowing at AGDF that Friday night, as the facility was filled with spectators who journeyed from around the state to watch the only FEI CDI 5* competition.

"I heard the crowd at the end, and I really felt it on the way out. I thought to myself that that was the biggest applause we've ever had. I know the music is fun and it gets people out of their seats. I think that going last with that music was a little bit like, 'Okay, lets finish this party."

Fellow Danish teammate Lars Petersen and the veteran mare Mariett performed for the second time this season at AGDF and collected second place honors, as the 18-year-old mare looked poised and energized in the ring.

"I was pretty pleased with our test. We showed the last CDI and then this competition here, but other than that we haven't shown since April of last year," noted Petersen. "I've had a little bit of a hard time finding a rhythm I must admit. Our Grand Prix test was not so good, but today I felt like we had a bit better rhythm. To me we just felt a little rusty still."

One of the top combinations, Steffen Peters and Legolas 92, battled through a few mistakes in their test to ultimately receive a score of 76.425%. While the test looked fluid, Peters felt the tension that ultimately detracted from their score.

"Today was very tough. I was sitting not on just one stick of dynamite tonight, but it was a whole case underneath of me," said Peters of the 2002 Westphalian gelding. "That's just the case with this horse. It can go absolutely brilliantly like he did two weeks ago when he is relaxed. I felt today in the warm-up that he was pretty keyed up. Of course, it's disappointing, but we've dug ourselves out of this spot before and we'll try to do the same in the future."

Judge at C, Thomas Lang (AUT) commented on the strong showing of the evening's competition and referenced that AGDF has created a new epicenter for the sport of dressage during the winter months.

"I think that it is very marvelous for the riders to compete here and for the judges. It's great because of the atmosphere here and the audience is really looking and hoping for these pairs. I think it's very good for the sport to have a show like this," he said. "There are so many people here and so many shows; it is that the whole world is looking to Wellington from January to March and really now this is the center of the dressage world for those three months."

Devon Kane of Diamante Farms, a founding sponsor of the AGDF venue, has been thrilled with the growth of the competition and was overwhelmed by the number of spectators who came out to witness the CDI 5^{*} Grand Prix Freestyle in real time.

"It's really been amazing to me, as a participant, but also watching from the background. When Mark [Bellissimo] approached us with this idea and Ken [Braddick] also, we had a lot of dressage people who stepped in. We did it as a family and now you see the corporate sponsors stepping in and the town getting involved. You have all of these people from Wellington coming to dressage," Kane expressed. "I think that's amazing that we've made this a center point of dressage, but also a venue for everyone else. The vision of AGDF has really come to par and morphed into what we all had hoped it would be from the beginning"

AGDF 5 Highlights Wednesday through Sunday

Steffen Peters (USA) and Rosamunde, owned by Four Winds Farm, made an impressive jump to the top of the standings with a score of 75.380% in the FEI Grand Prix CDI 3*, presented by Wellington Equestrian Realty, on Wednesday. Shelly Francis (USA) and Danilo finished in second place with a 72.240%, while Kasey Perry-Glass (USA) and Goerklintgaards Dublet collected third place honors with a 71.020%.

Topping a talented field of seasoned international competitors, Laura Graves (USA) and Verdades returned to their winning ways in the FEI Grand Prix CDI 5*, presented by Diamante Farms on Thursday. Graves and Verdades were the final ride in the class of 30 entries and received a 76.440%. Steffen Peters (USA) and Legolas 92 collected second place with a 74.100%, while Mikala Gundersen (DEN) and My Lady earned third with a 71.760%.

Christina Vinios and Folkestone OLD served as the first American pair to take a win in Small Tour competition at AGDF this season, as the combination bested a class of 28 entries in the FEI Prix St. Georges, presented by Kirk Arabians. Vinios and Folkestone OLD received a 72.842% for first place, while Leida Collins-Strijk, who has dominated the Small Tour so far this season, took home second and third place honors aboard Don Tignanello and Zantros respectively, with a 71.579% and 71.289%.

Christina Vinios and Folkestone OLD captured their second victory of the week in the FEI Intermediaire I CDI 1*, presented by Kirk Arabians, with a score of 72.316%. Virginia Yarur Ready (CHI) and Finn collected second place honors with a score of 70.237%, while Suzan Pape (GBR) and Samson 494 finished in third place with 69.816%.

The FEI Grand Prix Freestyle CDI 3*, presented by Wellington Equestrian Realty, was won with a 74.300% by Beatrice Marienau (USA) riding Stefano 8, her own KWPN (Gribaldi x Gracia) gelding. She was stunned by their success in the freestyle, but has steadily worked on improving the pair's marks in the arena throughout the year.

"It's still unreal to me. I think it takes a little bit to understand what happened here; it's amazing. He was really hot already in the warm-up today and I have to figure out how to channel that energy. He was very strong and the last couple of freestyles, I had a few problems in the beginning," she explained. "I was able to just take his energy and really dance within that. Through the whole test I knew that he was very strong, but also knew that's what makes him extremely special. That's when he looks big and looks impressive. I tried to let him do his job and just stay out of his way."

Shelly Francis and Patricia Stempel's Hanoverian (De Niro x Annabelle) gelding Danilo took second place in today's competition with a technically excellent and musically compelling performance that earned a 74.175%.

Arlene Page and her Danish Warmblood (Michellino x Alberte Lindebjerg) mare Alina took third place in today's competition with a 71.150%. She was exceptionally proud of her mare, who gave her another great performance.

Alongside their major contributions to the competition and facility, Adequan® has also taken a strong initiative to recognize the people who help make top sport possible, sponsoring each of the owner awards given throughout the night. Christopher Preston was awarded with the High Point National Show Owner Award, which was accepted on his behalf by rider Lauren Chumley for her performance aboard Hotstreak CF during AGDF 3. Lynda Hol accepted the High Point National Show Owner Award, as Karen Pavicic rode Beaujolais to a weekend high score during AGDF 4.

Christina Vinios and Folkestone OLD dominated Small Tour competition at AGDF 5, and earned themselves the FEI Prix St Georges Owner Award for their win in the division on Thursday. Janne Rumbough, owner of My Lady, winner of the FEI CDI 5⁺ Grand Prix Freestyle, was presented with the Grand Prix Freestyle Owner Award, while My Lady's groom Julie Albrechtsen accepted the Groom's Initiative Award presented by Mark Bellissimo, managing partner of Wellington Equestrian Partners, to reward her dedication and hard work as an integral member of the winning team.

Laura Graves (USA) and Verdades added another win to their week, as the duo scored a 74.667% to best the FEI Grand Prix Special CDI 5*, presented by Diamante Farms. Tinne Vilhelmson-Silfven (SWE) and Benetton Dream finished in second with a 72.412%, while Belinda Trussell (CAN) and Anton captured third place receiving a 71.431%.

While Verdades' test was not as exact or powerful as may be typically expected, it was an example of an established partnership that is continuing to grow with time. The judges recognized the maturity of their effort, awarding it a 74.667% for the win. Graves reflected on the experience of coming back to the ring after their last difficult competition.

"Today I really wanted to ride him down and let him have another good experience. Tonight I felt like it was far from being our highest score, the most precise, and certainly not our most powerful, but he was 100% himself tonight and that was a really good feeling," she explained. "What we did in the Grand Prix on Thursday really paid off and it's good to feel like I have him back knowing that I could have ridden better."

Tinne Vilhelmson-Silfven and Benetton Dream, ownd by Lövsta Stuteri, represented Sweden with excellent style, earning a 72.412% for a solid test that featured sweeping half-passes and a strong piaffe-passage tour. Vilhelmson-Silven noted that this is only the second time that the 12-year-old Hanoverian stallion has done the Special and was pleased with his performance.

Belinda Trussell rode Anton, owned by Robyn Eames and Marc Trussell, to third place after an already successful campaign at AGDF so far this season. Trussell noted that Anton's natural capacity for piaffe makes the Grand Prix Special a great test for him.

Steffen Peters (USA) and Rosamunde continued their dominance in Large Tour competition at AGDF, earning top scores in the FEI Grand Prix Special CDI 3*, presented by Wellington Equestrian Realty, to take the class with a 73.333%. Kasey Perry-Glass (USA) and Goerklintgaards Dublet earned another top finish, adding a second place collection for the week, while young talent Juan Matute, Jr. (ESP) and Quantico Ymas earned third place with a 69.059%.

Virginia Yarur Ready (CHI) and her own Finn concluded the final day of week five of the Adequan® Global Dressage Festival (AGDF) with a win in the FEI Intermediaire I Freestyle, presented by Kirk Arabians, at Palm Beach International Equestrian Center (PBIEC). Yarur Ready and Finn scored a 71.550% for first place, while Michael Klimke (GER) and Royal Dancer 33 collected second place with a 70.975%. Tina Irwin (CAN) and Fancy That finished just behind Klimke with a 70.275% for third place. ■ Carly Weilminster and Allison Kavey

The vision for Lövsta from the beginning was to improve Swedish dressage by breeding, training and competing top quality horses and also by training and educating young riders. What began as a dressage operation then also moved into the sport of show jumping in Europe and abroad.

"This year I find that people are getting more and more curious about breeding," Johnson noted. "So many great horses are imported to the US, but what if there were to be a fine dressage breeding program here as well! We have brought one of our stallions, Benetton Dream, with us this year again. This serene and powerful horse has been very successful at the show this winter after two intense breeding seasons in Europe. If more horses were bred in the USA it would be a great boost to the sport."

Since five years back, a team of Lövsta riders and top horses have a winter camp at "Lövsta South" in Wellington, where the horses are trained and competed in the warm Florida sun. An unusual and rewarding project in Florida is Lövsta South's commitment to Vinceremos Therapeutic Riding Center in a specific project to support young people with special challenges by introducing them to the world of horses. A new addition for 2016 is Lövsta Ranch, a workman style ranch house that Johnson had built right across the street form Lövsta South. The house serves as a gathering place for family, friends and colleagues. Johnson held a roof topping ceremony for 50 people as the final beams were raised, inaugurating the home and celebrating the workers who constructed the house.

The idea for Lövsta Ranch originated from Johnson's time spent in Nevada as a child, as well as her 70th birthday celebration at a ranch in Wyoming. Johnson has been a leader in developing equestrian sport in many disciplines and recently returned to her early love of western riding. She recently purchased a reining horse and a cutting horse that she rides out on the trails every day after a workout on her dressage horses.
